# Andrew Young to get lifetime Emmy

Documentaries, TV show production part of long career.

Former mayor already has Peabody Award.

Andrew Young, 79, will re-ceive a lifetime Emmy on Fri-day, and those wondering how a politician wins a broad-cast honor should know that before he was a civil rights strategist, Young was a TV man.

From 1957 to 1961, Young and his wife, Jean Childs, lived in New York and he worked for the National Council of Churches. His re-

sponsibilities included producing a Sunday morning television show, "Look Up and Live."

The young minister used music to attract a youthful au-

dience, bringing such artists as Odetta and Dave Brubeck onto the show, which eventually won a Peabody Award. "We used contemporary artists to tell the gospel story," Young said. "We had a number of programs built around jazz and spirituals and the blues."

More important, by crafting his narrated 60-second and 90-second introductions Young learned how to tailor
